

Councilman Josh Whitley to Host Clements Ferry Road Town Hall

Supervisor Peagler, Mayor Tecklenburg and Chairman Rozier among speakers

Berkeley County Councilman Josh Whitley announced in a press release last week that he will host a special Town Hall Meeting about Clements Ferry Road improvements on Monday, January 18, 2016 at the Daniel Island School. The Town Hall, which will begin at 7 p.m. and include discussions with SCDOT Chairman Jim Rozier, Berkeley County Supervisor Bill Peagler and Charleston Mayor John Tecklenburg, is open to the public.

"From the outset of my service, I have always maintained that the widening of Clements Ferry Road is the number one issue for the residents of Council District 2 in Berkeley County," said Whitley. "This 2008 project has suffered many delays, which in turn caused suffering of our neighbors on the Clements Ferry Road Corridor."

According to a press release, Whitley has had regular meetings regarding this project with County Supervisor Peagler and other state, county and city officials and notes his pleasure that County Supervisor Peagler

shares his belief that the Clements Ferry Road improvement project is a top priority for Berkeley County.


"Sharing information with the public - particularly about infrastructure improvement projects - is extremely important,"

said Peagler. "I commend Councilman Whitley for organizing this Town Hall, join Councilman Whitley in thanking Chairman Rozier for his interest in helping us move this project forward, and look forward to empowering the residents with factual updates of this project."

Joining Chairman Rozier, Supervisor Peagler and Councilman Whitley at the Town Hall will be Charleston Mayor John Tecklenburg, Charleston City Councilman Gary White, State Senator Larry Grooms, State Representative Jim Merrill, Berkeley County Sheriff Duane Lewis and Berkeley County School Board Member Mac McOuillin.

"We are all concerned with the widening project," said McQuillin. "With the addition of three new schools in the next two years, the importance of the project is extraordinary. To have this line-up of officials coming to answer questions, give updates and listen to our constituents shows just how high of a priority this project is for our elected officials."

Resolutions: What's the trick to keeping 'em?

It's been 22 years since I've made a New Year's resolution. Well, that's not entirely accurate. For more than two decades I've answered the question with a simple: "Why yes, I've resolved not to make any New Year's resolutions!" Needless to say, I've been quite successful these last 22 years (ha ha).

For some reason, this year is different. I've penned more than half a dozen and now face the daunting challenge of achieving them. Where to turn? To the research, of course, in search of sage advice about how to avoid the mind traps that typically derail long-term commitments.

But before we share our 4-point tip sheet, let's take a moment to touch on temporal landmarks, marketplace trends, and some unique resolutions that I wish I'd had on my list.

Temporal landmarks – Akin to the term physical landmarks, temporal landmarks represent specific days that allow us to create a "fresh start" (e.g., "I'll start that on my birthday, or after the holiday, or next Monday, next week or next month"). Temporal landmarks, according to an article at www.theconversation.com, represent a "demarcation between a past self, who has perhaps failed to meet goals, and the present self, who has goal pursuit at their fingertips."

By the numbers – an estimated 40 percent of us make New Year's resolutions each year, and the areas targeted are much what you'd expect - nearly half fall into one of three standard categories: losing weight, improving our financial outlook and finding a new job. Success rates? Not as bad as you might think. While it's true

that a third of us don't last a month, an impressive 50 percent make it for six months.

Unique resolutions – In recent days, I've come across some provocative ones. For instance: "Learn something you never learned as a child" or "learn a decent party trick." And then there's "validate people in my life more" and "worry less." I like that last one (and am open to any and all recommendations on how to accomplish it!). But my favorite resolution came from columnist Joel Klein, who this past weekend tweeted: "How about this for a new year's res: let's educate our kids before we graduate them, not vice-versa." (Klein was reacting to a recent New York Times editorial titled "The Counterfeit High School Diploma").

OK, now on to the tips.

Watch your language! No surprise here, word choice matters. My personal tip is to avoid using the word "every" (as in: "try a new food each week," or "go for a walk every day," or "take a friend to lunch once a month"). Don't get me wrong. I like the ideas, but chances are that the words "every" or "daily" will tend to bind us and lead to a spiral of negative thinking that slows our progress. So go ahead, if you've already made some resolutions that might be overly demanding, feel free to revise them. In a similar vein, experts encourage us to avoid being negative (for example, instead of setting a goal to lose 20 lbs., try to re-frame the goal in terms of improving your health).

Harness the skills, and know why you're doing it! Two elements worth noting: 1. It's critical to know why you're making the resolution (see Langer's quote below); and 2. It takes skill to accomplish our goals. Said Dr. John Norcross, a professor of psychology at the University of Scranton, as quoted in an article at http://www. dailymail.co.uk: "Largely people are unprepared for change . . . A fair number just clink

the champagne glasses and confuse a resolution with a wish. . . . They certainly want to be inspired and motivated at the beginning, but when that gives out within the week, they need to be able to [rely on their] skills."

As for knowing why, Harvard professor Dr. Ellen Langer was quoted as saying: "When you make a resolution to do something other than what deeply feels comfortable for you, it's unlikely that you're going to do it. If somebody is anxious and they eat to make themselves feel good, making a resolution not to over-consume is likely going to fail. Better for the person to recognize their relationship between stress and eating – and deal with the stress." Added Langer: "If you don't know what leads to the behavior in the first place, it's only a matter of time before you'll break [your resolution] in the second place."

Questions, not statement. There's a body of thought (though it's hard to know how valid it is) that if you frame your resolutions as questions, you'll have more luck fulfilling them. Here's one example from professor Eric Spangenberg, University of California, Irvine: Instead of simply saying "I will exercise more," try asking yourself "Will I exercise more?" and then answer (with enthusiasm, of course). "YES!" (I've tried, it, quite interesting!)

Find a friend. The stats are compelling – committing to a goal with a friend leads to far greater success. Explained an article published at the conversation.com: "One research study found signing up for a weight-loss program with friends and having that social support reinforced over time resulted in an increase from 75 to 95 percent in course completion. It even resulted in an increase from 24 to 66 percent in weightloss maintenance, compared to signing up alone and receiving treatment not focused on social support."





U.S. Air Force General Hansen (Retired) to speak at the February event

On Wednesday, February 3, USAF General (Retired) Al Hansen will talk about his career as well as the reality of military budget reductions and how they might impact Joint Base Charleston.

As a four-star U.S. Air Force General, General Hansen has attained a rank held by few others. He is in the company of such American heroes as Henry "Hap" Arnold, Jimmy Doolittle, Lucius Clay, and Curtis LeMay. Remarkably, General Hansen began his career as an enlisted man in the Air Force. He received his pilot wings in February 1955 and quickly ascended the ladder to achieve the military's highest possible rank.

General Hansen had a major impact on the air mobility forces of the United States. He led the team that finalized the consolidation of C-130's into the Military Airlift Command. He was the Joint Chiefs of Staff Director for the project that created U.S. Transcom. The success of this command was manifested in the Desert Storm victory, considered one of the most massive logistics undertakings in history.

Amongst his many awards and decorations are the Defense Distinguished Service Medal. Legion of Merit with two oak leaf clusters, Distinguished Flying Cross with oak leaf cluster, and the Bronze Star.

General Hansen lives right here on Daniel Island and has agreed to share with us his experiences and keen insight regarding the future of our military forces.

General Hansen will speak on Wednesday evening, February 3. The event is at the Daniel Island Club, in the ballroom. Doors open at 6:30 p.m.; the program starts at 7 p.m., and will conclude around 8 p.m. Business casual attire is appropriate.



Mission Possible: Daniel Island School teacher and pastor husband to evangelize in Greece



Athens, Greece. The city brings to mind ancient temples, mythological gods, even festive music, dancing and good food that's so much part of the fabric of a culture proud of its history and heritage. Yet there's another, bleaker, picture of Athens, the capital city of a country reeling from a major economic crisis; 30 percent of the city's residents are out of work, 60 percent are young adults struggling to stand on their own. Aggravating the financial tension is the recent, rampant overcrowding as thousands of refugees from Syria, Afghanistan, other parts of western Asia and Africa, seek asylum from the horrors taking place in their homelands.

Worst of all, perhaps, is a lack of hope and sense of purpose among many Athenians. While a small fraction of the city's residents, about two percent, seek solace in the Orthodox Church, a vast majority of Athenians are agnostic, especially the young adults who have distanced themselves from the church of their parents. Without faith, without a pole to cling to in the recent storm of change, life in Athens can prove to be a daunting and depressing daily struggle.

There is some good news, however. If you look very, very carefully, in the direction of the Acropolis and Mars Hill where the Apostle Paul shared his own testimony with Athenians, you can see a small ray of light beaming brightly amid the thick fog of darkness and despair that hovers over the city. It's a light of hope emanating from the First Greek Evangelical Church where a small group of residents of the city have found a faith in Christ that works for them and a welcoming place to worship.

Comprising barely three-tenths of one percent of the city's entire population of twelve million, this group may be small, but

it's slowly growing, thanks to the faith of its members. Led by visionary pastor, Panagiotis Kantartzis, this 150-year old church offers an authentic, believable connection to God. The church is a bedrock from which new believers can share their own experience and testimony with others, native Athenians and immigrants alike, who have lost hope.

But to effectively spread the message of the Gospel throughout Athens, to thousands of people, requires significant amounts of time, energy and know-how. Not only to plant more churches like this Greek evangel-

ical church, but to share personal testimony, teach the important lessons from Scripture and answer anxious questions from nonbelievers about God. Who on earth could possibly commit to such a tall order?

Look no further than Caroline Miller, third grade teacher at the Daniel Island School and her husband Mike, a former pastor.

As evangelical missionaries, Caroline and Mike are a select and courageous group of Christians who share a passion for bringing faith to others - agnostic, atheist or other non-Christian - through the teachings in the Gospel. Missionaries usually commit

several years, often overseas, to help spread the Christian faith by planting churches and sharing their own testimony with nonbelievers, persuading them to consider a better life with Christ. True, missionaries are ordinary people like you and me. They just come with extra layer of grit, humility, integrity and determination to carry out extraordinarily selfless goals.

The Millers recall their first mission trip, fifteen years ago, to a small village in Hunan Province, China, where villagers prayed daily at the shrines of their ancestors. This generations-old belief system was shrouded in superstition and anxiety. A bad harvest would send families agonizing over which ancestor they might have offended. When Mike and Caroline arrived, the people were ready for a better solution - and a merciful God who would take care of them unconditionally. With the help of other Christian Asians in the area, the villagers learned to read the Bible, accept Christ as their Savior.... and replace the family shrines with pictures of Jesus.

"We want to make a difference in people's lives," points out Mike. "We did that in China and I trust we can make an impact again in Athens. We're just wired to do this kind of work."

After returning home from China, the Millers opened a successful local cleaning business. Once all three children were in school (sons Silas and Jared are both alums of Daniel Island School while daughter Ella currently attends 5th grade there), Caroline pursued another passion, teaching elementary school; She ultimately landed a position at the Daniel Island School, where, as a highly respected member of the school community for the past eight years, she teaches third grade. Mike also took a new role as a

In his last season, Skylar Hunter broke The Citadel's and Southern Conference records for career saves with 41.

It seems the Bishop England volleyball program is always in the news. This fall, the Bishops made national news.

The Bishops topped Buford in straight sets with a 25-15, 25-13, 25-17 victory in the Class AA state championship.

"It's a great team accomplishment," coach Kristin Fleming Arnold said. "To win 20 state championships, including the last five in a row, is extremely impressive. The girls have something to celebrate, something to be proud of."

DI SŴIM TEAM ENJÓYS BEST SEA-SON

After six straight years finishing No. 3 in the City Swim Meet, the Daniel Island Flying Fish took a big step to reaching the top of the Lowcountry swimming mountain with a second-place finish.

Snee Farm finished with 2,900 points, while Daniel Island tallied with 2,395 points. Coosaw Creek was third with 2,334.5 points, followed by Northbridge Terrace with 2,141.5 and Newington with 1,869.5.

"Absolutely, this is something we can build on, something that can motivate us to try harder," coach Rose Van Metre said. "I think we got a little comfortable at No. 3. This will give us great motivation."

Van Metre said the key was to climb the latter, not descend it next year.

"I know winning it will be a tough challenge," she said. "I know holding onto second place will be just as tough. But everyone improved their times. "Everyone was focused."

YOUNG GOLFERS FARE WELL

Daniel Island is home to many talented, young golfers, including Kathleen Sumner and Ben Burton.

Sumner fared very well since May when she competed at the high school level. She was second in the state as an individual and helped the BE girls to a second-place finish in the team standings.

She switched gears and then competed as a

member of the Bishop England boys' team, a squad that had so much talent it won the Class AA state title.

She scored a victory in the Carolina Golf Association's 49th Twin States Junior Girls' Championship, which was held in early July in Chapel Hill, N.C.

She followed that up with a couple of solid finishes, placing fifth in the Blade Junior Classic, which was held in Greer. On Friday, her bid to defend her title at Daniel Island came up a little short as she finished second to Burton.

Burton also had a busy summer. He played in more than a dozen tournaments including a long-distance trip to Naples, Fla. He also played a little closer to home, winning the Daniel Island Junior Club Championship last week with a slim victory over Sumner.

"Every day I hit a few balls," Burton said.
"But over the past year, I found it's just as important to play. You can go out and beat balls all day. It's not the same experience."

He also is a member of the Bishop England golf team and hopes to step up and become a team leader as the Bishops set their aim on a fourth consecutive Class AA state championship.

HÂNAHAN WINS SECOND STRAIGHT STATE TRACK AND FIELD TITLE

In late May, Hanahan won its second consecutive state championship and third in the last five years with an impressive performance at Harry Parone Stadium on the campus of Spring Valley High School.

The Hawks scored 97 points to win the twoday meet. Hanahan dominated the state meet in three events to claim the title.

Samuel Denmark and Quincy Mitchell finished first and third, respectively, in the 100- and 200-meter dashes to give the Hawks 32 points in the two events. Denmark, who struggled mightily in the 100 at the state qualifier with a disappointing fifth-place finish, recorded a time of 10.65 in the 100 to edge out the field, including Mitchell, who clocked in at 10.87.

Denmark claimed gold in the 200 with a time of 21.58 to hold off another foe and Mitchell, who turned in a time of 21.81.

The two runners were key ingredients in the Hawks' 4x100-meter relay team that captured a gold medal with a time of 41.72. Saheim Brooks and Greg Casselman were the other members of the team. The victory was worth 10 points

The Hawks collected another 18 points in the shot put as Dominique Green edged out teammate Tre Smalls to give the Haws a 1-2 finish

ANGELIQUE KERBER WINS HER FIRST FAMILY CIRCLE CUP TITLE

Angeliqe Kerber won her first Family Circle Cup title and she did it in under pressure.

In the championship against Madison Keys, she won the first set 6-2, but dropped the second set 6-4. Keyes led the third set 4-1, but Kerber rallied to win her first FCC title with a

6-2, 4-6, 7-5 victory.

"It's unbelievable," Kerber said. "To win here after the really difficult weeks I had, I'm feeling great. Last year I had four finals and I didn't win any of them, so it's great that I actually won this one today. It's just been a great week for me here. Everybody is so nice, and I'm really happy about my game."

The win in Charleston was Kerber's fourth WTA title, and second at the Premier level - she also won Paris [Indoors] in 2012. Her other two came at Copenhagen in 2012 and Linz in 2013

BE GIRLS BASKETBALL SUCCESS CONTINUES

The Bishop England girls' basketball team had individual and team success – again – during the 2014-15 basketball season.

In January, coach Paul Runey recorded his 600th career victory when the Bishops beat archrival Porter-Gaud. He became only the sixth girls' basketball coach in state history to reach the milestone.

"Any coach will tell you, and I know it sounds cliche, but winning 600 games is a result of the program," Runey said. "I have been blessed with great players and coaches. The point is, I've never won one game. We have had some great kids come up through the program."

In March, the Bishops won the state title with a 50-36 victory over Pendleton in the title game. That was the finishing touch on a 23-4

season.

The Bishops became only the third Class AA team to win three titles in four years and the victory gave them a 101-9 record over the last four years.

SKÝLAR HUNTER SETS CITADEL SAVE RECORD, GETS DRAFTED BY PHILLIES

Skylar Hunter was known more for his catching skills when he made the Hanahan baseball team his freshman year. But by the time he graduated from The Citadel, he was pure pitcher.

He appeared in 95 games during his career at The Citadel, recording 147 strikeouts with an earned-run average of 3.49 over 131.1 innings.

In his last season, the right-hander broke The Citadel's and Southern Conference records for career saves with 41.

As a junior in 2015, Hunter pitched 53 innings for the Bulldogs, collecting 13 saves and striking out 59 opponents with an ERA of 3.74.

In June's Major League draft, he was selected in the 12th round as the 354th overall pick. He was assigned to Williamsport of the short-season New York-Penn League and pitched in 22 games – all in relief. He was 3-3 with a 3.48 ERA. He struck out 21 batters in 33 2/3 innings.

"It's baseball, baseball all of the time," Hunter said. "I'm just glad to be living my dream. It's an honor and thrill to make a living by playing baseball. But it is a grind."






