

Remove cloud cover from public information, let sun shine in

It's not so much a celebration as it is an awareness campaign.

Throughout the state and all across the country, this week – March 13-19 – is designated as Sunshine Week. The

week has nothing to do with weather conditions but everything to do with how the country is weathering a constant chipping away of its rights to be served by a transparent government in which public information flows readily into the hands of the people served by those they elect and appoint. This applies to the grassroots level, the state level and, certainly, the federal level.

Here in South Carolina we frequently hear lawmakers state their staunch support for the public's right to access public information, but let meaningful legislation hit the floor and watch how quickly the particulars are debated and kept at bay from a vote as it is batted back and forth in committee until. suddenly and quite deliberately, another session has come and gone with little or nothing accomplished.

State Rep. Bill Taylor, R-Aiken, has been on the front lines for years now in an effort to bring about logical and meaningful changes to the state's Freedom of Information Act, a law whose teeth sit like a set of dentures in a bedside glass. Taylor has sought to reduce fees associated with obtaining public information, fees that are often arbitrary at best, deliberately intimidating at worst. Exorbitant hourly research fees are foisted on the public in an effort to stave off further inquiries. Roadblocks are established that are the equivalent of an inquisition into why someone in the public sector wants access to information it rightfully should receive. Delay tactics are deployed that allow public bodies to shelter information until receipt of the information becomes irrelevant. Copy fees far in excess of what any office supply store would charge are assessed for information that could easily be transmitted electronically because nowadays so much



information is stored digitally.

Do not be fooled by the platitudes that roll out of the mouths of lawmakers who claim they are doing the public's business in full and open view as they attach amendments, debate Freedom of Information committee, I urge you amendments and hold public information hostage in committee. Do not be fooled by lawmakers who claim to be staunch supporters of open, transparent government who then stonewall efforts to open the doors and windows to the public eve instead of working in concert with other lawmakers to remodel a state law in public servants that they work for you. need of repair on the public's behalf.

We are in an era in which government does not seem to mind extending its reach into gathering information on us, but resists - and even erodes – efforts by the public to access information that belongs in its purview.

Newspapers have long been the champions of the people's right to access public information. We continue that effort today and strive to help bring about a greater understanding of what is public information through stories, editorials and, on occasion, lawsuits that must be filed as a last resort to pry from the hands of public bodies that which belongs in the hands of the public.

As chairman of the S.C. Press Association's to develop a greater understanding of what constitutes public information and your rights to that information under the state's Freedom of Information Act. And I urge you to remind your school boards, your town, city and county councils, your state lawmakers, your

Tell them that when it comes to accessing public information, you want the forecast to be and remain sunny. There's been too much cloud cover already.

In the March 17, 2006 issue. the top news story was that Gov. Sanford came to Daniel Island to announce that the 1,300-acre tract of undeveloped State Ports Authority land on the south end of Daniel Island would be sold for residential development. The authority originally planned to build a large shipping terminal on the property but abandoned the project after fierce opposition from local residents and politicians. Sanford presented a plan that called for the development of the 1,300-acre tract as a "Central Park" with lots of green space. Ten years later and the land remains in SPA ownership.




The six contestants receiving the highest number of votes will have the opportunity to sing the National Anthem during the Volvo Car Open.

Hope For Discouraged Leaders

If you are alive and breathing, you can still become everything God has created you to be. – Joel Osteen

In 1858 the Illinois legislature- using an obscure statute- sent Stephen A. Douglas to the U.S. Senate instead of Abraham Lincoln, although Lincoln had won the popular vote. When a sympathetic friend asked Lincoln how he felt, he said, "Like the boy who stubbed his toe: I am too big to cry and too badly hurt to laugh."

If you hang around in leadership long enough you will know what discouragement feels like. I'm not trying to depress you but simply stating the obvious. Behind the glittering image and friendly smiles are leaders who face incredible pressures and shoulder responsibilities that can be daunting. Unfortunately, many leaders feel trapped with no one to talk with or vent to due to the "glittering image" that they feel compelled to present to the public.

So let's be honest. Times of discouragement will come. How you react to it will make all the difference going forward. As a leader, you are not immune from troubles-in fact, you may have more. So how do you keep a proper perspective and come through it on the other side a better leader? Here are three reminders that you need to consider

YOÙ ARE NOT ALONE

Life happens to all of us. It's not always pretty. As a leader you know this to be true. Disappointments come – you didn't land that new client, a colleague betrayed you, sales are sluggish - you get the picture.

Here is what you need to know: your disappointment today is preparing you for great opportunities tomorrow. But there's a catch. It all hinges on your attitude. While bad things can happen to good people; good people turn bad things into great opportunities.

At a young age Walt Disney easily could have been discouraged and given up. He was fired by the editor of a newspaper for "lacking ideas". He could have taken his rejection and thrown in the towel. But if anything he used that experience to motivate him to greater things – and the rest as they say is history.

So when times of disappoint and discouragement come remember this truth - you are

YOU ARE STRONGER THAN YOU THINK

One truth I've learned over the years is this:

you can be defined by life's moments or you can define life's moments. So how do you define life's moments? Times of discouragement will come. But the good news is- it will pass. Stay strong and be encouraged. You are not alone, you are strong, and you are prepared!

SC STRONG

offers hope, new direction for those seeking help

Intensive intervention program making its mark on new generation

itting in a stately remodeled former officer's house on the old Navy Base in North Charleston, dressed in a sharp business suit, Jeff Ballard is articulate, focused, and crystal clear about his current mission in life.

"We teach people," he said, while describing the South Carolina STRONG program that he leads on the site. "We teach them how to live their lives. We give them meaning and a reason to carry on."

Both mentally and physically, Ballard is arguably a far cry from what he presented to this same facility some five years ago, when he entered on a judge's order as an ex-offender who would otherwise have been on his way to prison.

"I had never been to prison," he said. "But I was certain this had to be better than that."

Today, he has successfully matriculated from SC STRONG, having met all of the program's requirements, and now serves as the executive director.

"My probation is now long over," added Ballard, who still resides on the SC STRONG campus and spends much of his time counseling those taking part in the program. "So I am no longer court-ordered to be here. I've stayed around for a few reasons, but mostly because I wanted to help give back to a place that was key to my recovery. And I believe in what we do here. It's easy for me to get behind it and feel good about it. That's part of me continuing on that right path."

Ballard was the seventeenth resident to become part of the Charleston area SC STRONG initiative, which is modeled after the successful "Delancey Street" program based in San Francisco, California. Like its five other Delancey Street counterparts across the country, SC STRONG seeks to help ex-criminals, substance abusers, the homeless, and others who have hit rock bottom, embark on new beginnings through intensive intervention in a structured setting. All of the residents are men. Each commits to spending two years living and working on the site, which includes three large homes and expansive grounds. They work for

the benefit of the program and earn their keep by part pating in a number of SC STRONG-run businesses, v include moving services, catering, furniture restoration light construction, and landscaping.

"We are a self-sufficient program," said Ballard. ". have businesses that we run that pay for all the bills, a there are a lot of expenses. So the residents come in a they are active participants in their recovery...No one a hand out saying 'please help me.' They understand coming in."

The number one requirement? You have to want to

"We're looking for people that are really trying to change their life," added Ballard, a top student who is to earning his Associates Degree from Trident Technic College. "This isn't a homeless shelter. It's not a flop for people who can just come and stay for a little whi til they feel better. We're looking for people that are we to take two years and get their lives together."

There are two ways to gain entry to the program. A 70 percent arrive via the aforementioned alternative sentencing route, said Ballard. Another 30 percent sir walk-in and ask.

"In most cases, they would be homeless, because i they had options, they would be using them," said Ba "There is a bench in the foyer of this house. We sit th the bench and say 'let's get an interview process start There is a criteria for those we accept to determine if STRONG is a good fit...In certain cases, we may direct them to other places that may be able to help...We do accept everyone."

Among the criteria for admission - residents have to sober and non-violent. The facility's homes can take 55 people, Ballard added. Right now they have 35. Start SC STRONG was founded here nine years ago, some men have been served through the program. Participal commit to a daily schedule that includes attending regresident meetings designed to encourage and support one another, conducting work around the complex and grounds, and taking care of basic house functions like cooking, cleaning, and laundry. In addition, those in 10 of educational help take classes twice weekly from or residents who have already earned their General Educ Degrees. Those newest to the program initially enter

"It takes someone who is really willing to put the work in, to do what you need to do," added Ballard. "The outcome is you're gonna leave with a job, with money in your pocket, and a place to go. You're gonna have all of that stuff figured out before you leave. And if that's not the goal, then this might not be the place for you."

When asked if SC STRONG

has had any interest from residents of the so-called "Tent City" in downtown Charleston, a homeless conglomerate near the Meeting Street exit that is in the process of being dismantled by the City of Charleston, Ballard said "no."

"I can only give my opinion, but I feel like a large portion of people who feel comfortable living in places like that aren't really looking for much more than that," he added. "If someone doesn't want help, there's not a lot you can do for them."

Thankfully, SC STRONG resident Thomas McArdle did want help when he entered the program a little over a year ago, instead of going to jail. Today, as he continues to work through the program, he helps get new residents acclimated and offers words of wisdom for those in need of counsel.

'We have this concept here where it's 'each one teach one," he said. "And it really goes a long way for residents here to be able to show somebody else something. It really means something."

Most of the work on the three homes on the SC STRONG campus was completed by the residents. Before the program moved in, all three structures were boarded up and vacant. McArdle proudly showed off the re-purposed properties on a recent tour, including the beautifully restored "Quarters C," a former Admiral's residence and the site of a recent campaign stop by Presidential Candidate

"This is our pride and joy right here," said McArdle, while pointing out the extensive remodeling done on the early 1900s-era home.

For McArdle, the pride he feels in leaving his mark on the physical structures here is just a small part of a much bigger reward. In addition to being one of the members who oversees the house and its residents, he also visits jails every day to screen potential new clients for the program.

"I was in jail once too," he said. "Now I go to jails and walk through them like I have a key in my pocket. It's pretty amazing. Hundreds of people write to us every month and unfortunately we can't help everybody. So it's a really strategic process trying to pick who we are going to allow in here...I definitely try to be a good role model for those people who come in behind me. It's very rewarding. The experiences that I've had here have been tremendous."

Daniel Island resident Meghan Bornstein is also a mighty proponent for SC STRONG. As a member of the SC STRONG Advisory Board, Bornstein has seen firsthand the difference the program makes in the lives of participants, particularly when residents are able to get out into the community and work for one of the SC STRONG businesses.

"I've always been somebody to root for the underdog," said Bornstein, who recently worked with Bishop England High School students to create a flyer for the program's moving services. "And when they're on a job or hosting an event, they have something to prove to people... They have pride in giving back. I just think there is something special when you watch these men on projects...There's something so thrilling about being around them and seeing the change in them. You can just see it in their eyes, and it's absolutely awesome."

Ballard may once have been considered an underdog himself. But not anymore.

"I had to figure out why I was living my life that way," he said, of the dark days that preceded his arrival at SC STRONG. "I just needed to get some understanding of myself...And I had a strong desire to change that. Thank goodness this place allowed me to go through all of the phases that I needed to go through, while keeping me safe...People do see people doing better here and want to stay and get their lives together. I'm very proud of that."

fishing trends

Thanks to all attendees of the fishing class on Saturday. I appreciate your time and support of the Lucy Boyle Memorial Fund. After class, the youngest attendee (my neighbor Luke) joined me for a quick fishing trip. The weather was warm (almost hot) but a strong breeze against the tide made for rough conditions in the Wando.

Over the past week or so, Trout have moved out of their winter homes (deep channels and ledges) into shallow water areas. When shallow, the Trout tend to congregate in creek mouths on the falling tide. So this is where Luke and I began fishing (after a rough ride up river). Upon our arrival, Luke selected a rod rigged with a Trout Trick on a Trout Eye jig. His first cast was perfectly placed (in the current seam formed by water draining out of the creek). Almost immediately, a Trout inhaled his lure. After a quick picture, Luke carefully released the fish. It did not take long for him to catch another (and another). Luke has become a very good angler!

The large winter schools of Redfish are beginning to break up. More and more, I am seeing pods of 10 to 15 fish (verses schools of 50 to 100 in the winter). While more difficult to locate, the fish in smaller schools

are easier to catch. These fish seem to be much less wary (and hungry). While the large schools of winter are dissipating, there are still lots of Redfish in the shallows. This week, I will be targeting them with top water lures. My new favorite is a Lucky Craft Sammy 100. I have a much better hook up ratio (especially with Redfish) when using this lure.

It may be windy, but the Trout, Redfish and Flounder are plentiful and hungry.

The best thing you ate all month

Within one city, there is an island and a peninsula. (I know. Mind blown.) And on each land mass, there exists an authentic culinary representation of different nations. (Stay with me.) On the island: a comforting taste of old Italy. On the peninsula: a fiesta of Mexican flavors. What does this all mean? It means, my lucky Lowcountry friend, that you need only traverse a bridge or two to eat like an international jetsetter. We present... this month's Noshing Nirvana...

Katherine Smith, island resident and "jack of all trades" for the Daniel Island News, does not mince words: "Ristorante LIDI on Daniel Island has the best meatball appetizer." The eatery's Polpette, the Italian word for meatballs, is a mixture of pork and veal slow cooked in marinara sauce. Smith also makes known that the dish is served steaming hot, "which helps melt the fresh Parmesan that can be added by



Are these "the best" meatballs? According to a source very close to the Daniel Island News,

the server if you wish." (There are few among us who would not wish for that.)

And then it's as if Smith, sensing our reluctance to believe that she has actually found the holy grail of spherical protein, shuts us down with this: "A rich tomato-based marinara sauce provides just the right amount of moisture to dip each bite in to. And due to the slow cooking method, the meatballs melt in your mouth."

We are temporarily broken from our foodie dreamscape only by her pragmatic observation that LIDI's Polpette is a great low-carb option when dining Italian. Still, the spell is not broken, and we find ourselves counting the hours until we, too, can order this \$13 two massive meatball starter with a side salad as a full, delicious meal. Thank you, Katherine Smith, for your unapologetic candor and courageous superlative.

So far, Kimberly Jackson's addiction to downtown Charleston's Minero restaurant hasn't created strife at home or impacted her

career. So far. The Daniel Island resident was even willing to go public with her dependency on the Mexican fare in this printed space, knowing that doing so might prompt an intervention from those close to her.

"It's a given," Jackson discloses, "whenever we are trying to decide where to eat out that I will suggest Minero. And you better believe I drag the out of town guests there, too, just so I can get my fix."

And though that fix is fixed with any number of items on the menu -inventive tacos, grilled wings, queso fundido - the one that is perhaps most dependable in the Mula. Tender chunks of flavorful pumpkin and mushrooms are drizzled with a special sauce sandwiched between two perfect benne tortillas. And at \$6, it's totally accessible. Perhaps a little too accessible.

Acclaimed chef/owner Sean Brock is not one to let junkies... er, devotees... get away easily. "Did I mention the spicy margarita?" Jackson offers. "I don't believe it's on the menu, but if

2015. She had come over from the James Island and Mount Pleasant restaurants of J. Paul'z, where her third executive chef position had delivered both a blessing and a curse.

"With few exceptions, I was given free reign over the kitchen," recalls Farrell. "The challenge was doing that in two locations twenty miles apart."

Prior to that, the chef had been invited to help launch Hall's Chophouse. "I had been in Charleston for four years and had never worked downtown," she relates. "That was an experience I wanted to have. As for being there in the early stages, it is always interesting to watch a new restaurant grow from the ground up."

It proved a vastly different tenure than that she'd had with the storied Kiawah Island Club, where she'd kicked off her Lowcountry culinary career years before.

But before she arrived in Charleston, Farrell was a hobbyist cook and part-time caterer co-ed. Surprisingly, it was not until after graduating from college that she realized she wanted to parlay her skillful sideline into a career. Farrell credits the

first two chefs for whom she worked with having the most influence on how she approaches her craft today: "The first taught me an appreciation for detail and consistency; the other emphasized simplicity without compromising quality."

Farrell went on to attend a small pilot program of renowned culinary school Johnson & Wales in Vail, Colorado. Though she marked a distinguished finish, she surprises us again by modestly conceding that she was in good company. "All of the students were required to have at least a bachelors degree," Farrell explains. "Almost my entire class of forty graduated with honors. I suppose we were a little more mature and focused than students heading straight from high school."

Farrell continues to bring a focused and purposeful style to her management collaborations. Since she took the wheel at LIDI. lunch is now offered five days a week and dinner is served every evening. The menu has retained its Italian classics and Italian-American favorites, from picattas to marsalas and panini to spaghetti. But Farrell has added a category

for more surprising, innovative food (such as buffalo short rib with gnocchi and gremolata) with a Mediterranean influence, and says these items will be updated seasonally.

Another fun concept (surprise?) instituted since Farrell's arrival at LIDI is "Teacher Thursdays." The weekly event is

celebrated in the beloved corner bar, with happy hour kicking off at 3 p.m. to toast local educators with discount libations and snacks. LIDI is also hosting a wine dinner with live jazz on March 28. "We did one back in November and it was a great time," Farrell states, adding, "The band may even work in some swing music this

Under Farrell's thoughtful leadership, a coveted – yet somewhat elusive – culinary culture has been fostered. "What I find unique about us is the level of support and encouragement given across the board, from the owners to the wait staff," Farrell reveals. "It is refreshing to be in a restaurant without any animosity among the ranks. No silly front of the house versus back of the house. Everyone supports one another."

We concluded our interview with Chef Monica by asking what diners might be surprised to find goes on in the LIDI kitchen. And her parting shot was, in itself, a spot-on witty surprise: "No one is wearing pants back there...Just kidding."

DIS and Cane Bay students to compete at National Geographic State Bee

Daniel Poch, an 8th grade student at Daniel Island School, and Logan Agnew, an 8th grade student at Cane Bay Middle School, both have qualified for and will compete in the National Geographic State Bee in Columbia. The State Bee will be on Friday, April 1 at the Brookland Baptist Church Resource Center, Banquet and Conference Center, located at 1066 Sunset Blvd., West Columbia, SC.

Each fall, schools that wish to participate in the bee apply with the National Geographic Bee. Each participating school receives preliminary school bee question booklets, and a school final question booklet. The preliminary rounds can be held in classrooms, and the final rounds can be school-wide either during or after school. The school champion then must take a qualifying test to be eligible for the State Bee. Both Agnew and Poch became eligible to compete in the State Bee because of their scores on the qualifying test.

The State Bee is an oral competition with each student receiving questions in the practice round and eight preliminary rounds. The students with the top ten scores

tional talks, team building, a "meet and greet" with administration and teachers (those who are in place at that time), and hands-on engaging activities that focus on the school's planned STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and match) curriculum.

"We want the students to be as confident and comfortable coming into this new school as possible," said Dixon.

A large part of the focus now, reported both Dixon and Whitley, is getting all future students registered. According to Whitley, there is a great deal of interest being expressed by teachers who'd like to work at the new schools, but they have not started officially hiring instructional staff as of yet. Parents of all potential PSEMS students are encouraged to get registrations completed as soon as possible.

"One of the most important things, and I can't say it enough, is registration," said Whitley. "We're allocated (teachers) based on those numbers."

"Right now, they're not giving us allocations based on probable numbers," added Lisa Kerns, president of the PSMS PTA. "It's only on the hard numbers we have. So we'd really like to get those numbers up so we can get more teachers, and the

best teachers! The sooner the better."

Dixon and Whitley are also focusing on preparing the curriculums for the new schools. A Clemson STEAM Night is planned for April 19 at CEMS to give all PSEMS families an opportunity to engage in some of the types of STEAM activities their schools will employ. Staff members will also take part in STEAM training sessions over the summer.

"Besides the allocations and managerial piece, we just want to make sure that instructionally the kids get a rigorous and engaging program," added Dixon.

Both PTAs are also actively fundraising on behalf of the new schools. Community members are invited to purchase commemorative bricks that will be on permanent display on the campus. The next registration event will on April 12, beginning at 5:30 p.m., at St. Paul's Missionary Baptist Church.

Philip Simmons Elementary and Middle Schools are slated to open in August of this year, followed by the opening of the new Philip Simmons High School in the fall of 2017.


