'The boom is back'

DI economist offers annual fiscal forecast

What a difference six years can make.

The first time career economist Steve Slifer presented his popular end-of-year Economic Outlook conference on Daniel Island, his message largely focused on a nation still healing from what has been described as the greatest financial crisis since the Great Depression.

Fast forward to 2016 and the forecast has improved considerably. At his seventh annual event at the Daniel Island Club, Slifer was proud to report "the boom is back." A packed ballroom of guests from all over the Charleston region sat attentively as Slifer provided his take on the nation's current economic status and what we can expect down the road. As is typical for Slifer, he was cautiously optimistic.

"All is pretty good!" he said, in kicking off the program.

And Slifer should know. He has been an economist for almost 40 years, beginning his career with the Federal Reserve in Washington. That was followed by two decades as Chief U.S. Economist at Lehman Brothers. Slifer now runs his own consulting firm, NumberNomics, has written two books and is considered one of the top economists in the country.

THE TWO PERCENT RUT

To begin his presentation, Slifer turned to the Gross Domestic Product (GDP), one of the best measures of our nation's economic climate.

"We've been stuck in this two percent rut for a while," he noted, referencing one of the 100 plus slides he prepared for the program. "More importantly, what can we do to speed it up?"

The nation's "economic speed limit" can be an effective indicator of where things are headed, Slifer continued. To determine that figure, he combined the labor force growth and productivity growth.

"If you know how many people are working, and you know how efficient they are, you can probably figure out how many goods and services they can produce," he said.

In the 90s, the two numbers added up to about 3.5 percent. Today, we're at 1.8 percent. He predicts it will increase to 2.8 percent in

"The economy ought to be up in the 3.5 percent range in the good times," Slifer explained.

"And we're obviously disappointed that it's not doing that."

Productivity today is about 50 percent lower than it was 20 years ago, Slifer said, and while economists don't have a really good handle on why that is occurring, he offered some potential causes to his audience. First, the "baby boomers" are all retiring, which is taking a considerable number of employees out of the labor force. And it seems companies are not spending as much on growing productivity.

"Productivity growth is largely determined

by the pace of investment spending," Slifer said. "And that's dried up. It was growing 8 percent a couple of years ago and it has stopped."

Why is that? Slifer has some ideas. He cited a number of potential contributors – including a corporate tax rate of 35 percent (the average corporate tax rate around the world is 23 percent) and dual taxing on corporate earnings (they are taxed once overseas and again in the U.S. if earnings are repatriated).

"A lot of these overseas earnings are staying overseas," he explained. "And they're not bringing them back to the United States. Nobody knows quite how much money we're talking about – but I've heard numbers anywhere from \$2.5 to 4 trillion. So that's problematic."

Also impacting growth is what Slifer calls a "crushing" regulatory burden (the federal register is more than 80,000 pages), a dysfunctional health care system, and unstainable fiscal policy. Today's budget deficit is about \$500 billion, he said.

"The debt in relation to income is just going to get higher," he continued. "By the end of the decade it gets to what I would consider a dangerous level."

CALLING ON WASHINGTON

So how do we tackle these issues, while helping to spur investment spending?

"The solutions to these problems will require some sort of action by our policy makers in Washington," said Slifer. "In my view, our



"I remember when we had two," Sloan said.

Barred owl finds new home on DI

Daniel Prohaska of the Center for Birds of Prev knelt down atop a grassy bluff alongside a pond behind a home on Farr Street. As the sun set over a line of trees in the distance, he placed a small white box lined with tiny holes on the ground in front of him.

"Is everybody ready?" he asked the small crowd gathered for the occasion.

And with that, Prohaska opened the box and a majestic blur of brown and white soared up and

"He found a tree right away!" exclaimed Daniel Island resident Carol Wood, who attended the event with her husband, Bob.

"He's got that beautiful brown camouflage," responded Prohaska, who serves as development director for the Awendaw-based non-profit organization.

The guest of honor was a barred owl recently treated and rehabilitated by the Center for Birds of Prey after suffering injuries due to a collision with a car in Summerville. After several weeks, the Center staff determined the owl was ready to be released. Daniel Island residents Laurie and Dean Hubbs, supporters of the Center, offered to host a release event in the backyard of their home on December 2.

"It just touches my heart," said Laurie, after witnessing the release.

"We're excited to be able to get him back into

the wild where he belongs," said Prohaska. "... It's a rigorous process to get these birds ready for release. There is critical care, there is intermediate care, and then there is advanced flight recovery. And just like when you're going through a recovery and recuperation process, you have to be very careful how you move these birds along. We don't want them to stay in our care a day longer than they have to.'

When asked about the owl's age or sex, Prohaska said they were unable to determine that



survive their first year. The average life span of a bird is actually rather small. If they can make it through their first year, their odds of making it in the long run are much greater."

Prohaska also told the crowd that the owl released has only one eye, as the other was damaged during the accident and had to be removed during treatment.

"That sounds like a very traumatic thing to happen, but birds are very adaptable - even with one eye, because owls hunt mostly by sound,"

After landing in a nearby tree, the owl flew to the rooftop of a neighboring house and stayed for several minutes before lifting off again in the direction of a wooded area off Grand Council Street. One resident asked Prohaska if the owl would remain on Daniel Island.

"It will likely try to stay," he responded. "This is the perfect type of habitat. A lot will depend on how abundant the prey is. If there is a big food supply – lots of mice around – it will very likely stay. The larger the prey population, the more raptors that ecosystem can hold."

The Center for Birds of Prey was founded in 1991 and currently has more than 120 birds representing more than 50 species on exhibit. Last year, the Center impacted over 29,000 students and teachers in the state of South Carolina through its education outreach program. They have a total of 12 employees, as well as a volunteer staff of about 80 members who contributed over 18,000 service hours last year.

Prohaska reports that one in eight birds, roughly 12 percent of all birds worldwide, are at risk of becoming extinct in the next 100 years. Because birds of prey are found in a number of types of habitats, they offer an excellent warning system for human health.

"They are critical indicators of the overall health of the ecosystem," said Prohaska. "By studying these birds, we're learning about ourselves. We're learning about problems that are ultimately going to impact you and me."

A salute to Daniel Island's veterans

Last Wednesday, December 7, was the 75th anniversary of the "date which will live in infamy," the Japanese surprise attack on the U.S. Navy base at Pearl Harbor in Hawaii. It was a day of patriotic pride for veterans across the country - a day to remember one of the most calamitous and defining moments in American history.

The folks at the Summit Place senior living community on Daniel Island recognized the significance of the anniversary with a commemorative event entitled "A Veteran's Patriotic Message to the Future." The program had two components – one that was dedicated to the past and another that looked to the future. The Summit Place leadership team unveiled an impressive display at their facility, a new "Veterans Wall of Honor," and also sunk a time capsule into a space behind the wall not to be opened until November 11, 2066, on Veterans Day fifty years from

The new 21-foot by six-foot Veterans

Wall of Honor display recognizes the many veterans of the U.S. military who currently and in years past made their

home at Summit Place. Over a dozen of the facility's veterans, who served our country in times of war and peace all the

way back to World War II, were on hand for the unveiling, an event that induced both cheers and tears.

Attending the ceremony were veterans like 91-year-old Jack Gleason, a U.S. Navy communications officer who served on a base in the Pacific on the Marshall Islands from 1942 to 1945. Said Gleason of his time in the Pacific, "I was there to see the beginning of the end of the Japanese empire." Dorothy "Dottie" Pike was in attendance at the program, too. Pike was a U.S. Army Nurse who served in 1945.

The display was the idea of Summit Place Maintenance Director and Vietnam veteran Dan Gordon. A Navy man with patriotism "in his blood," Gordon comes from a long line of American military men that dates back to the Revolutionary War. He not only headed up the team that organized and planned the installation but also served as the master of ceremonies for the event.

"This is an extremely exciting day," noted Gordon, as he introduced himself to the folks gathered for the occasion. "Today we are commemorating the start of World War II with the attack on Pearl Harbor, but we're also remembering our veterans who served and not just in World

War II but in all the different wars after that as well. I'm excited that we're going to be able to honor you all with this wall that we're dedicating today. It's been a long time coming."

The wall itself spans a large section of one of the facility's main hallways. It features a center display with a framed U.S. flag dedicated to Summit Place by US. Army Veteran Sgt. William Westberg. Around the exhibit are branch of service plaques honoring each of the five branches of the U.S. military. Above the display are the words "Duty, Honor, Country," and flanking each side are over a dozen framed photographs of current and past Summit Place veterans.

Each photo is labeled with the service person's name, branch of the military in which he or she served, rank and years served, and on the corner of each is a small hook from which current Summit Place veterans hung commemorative dog tags made for the event. Veterans living at the facility were each issued a pair of dog tags, one for hanging beside their picture

on the wall and one to keep.

Following an official presentation of the colors and a collective reading of the Pledge of Allegiance, a prayer of dedication by pastor B.H. Rader from interdenominational North Charleston church Cathedral, and a reading from the World War II non-fiction book "Battlefields & Blessings: Stories of Faith and Courage from World War II" delivered by Summit Place resident and military widow Mabel Ward, the group arrived at the much-anticipated moment of the unveiling.

In addition to current veterans at Summit Place, family members of deceased veterans who had lived at the facility were invited to hang dog tags on the respective branch of service plaque.

Following the ceremony, Gordon set to the task of sealing the time capsule in the wall. The capsule was actually a trio of .30 caliber munitions boxes inside which the community was invited to place pictures, notes, and other small items of meaning for future generations to discover. Contributors signed messages on the

inside of the metal covering that locked the munitions boxes inside the wall, and the time capsule was sealed.

"I probably will not be here but I'm excited that we're able to create this patriotic message for the future, and with our country the way it is right now with so many different divisions I think it's important that we plant seeds into the future," said Gordon.

Following a moving rendition of the "Star Spangled Banner" by Bishop England student and singer Elizabeth Ludlam that left some of the vets in attendance saluting and some wiping tears from their wrinkled cheeks, it was Summit Place Administrator Sean Davis who took to the microphone to wrap up the afternoon's commemoration ceremony.

"This runs deep for many reasons and rightfully so," said Davis. "We're recognizing a lot of folks in our community and on a really important day...The nice thing about our community is that we are supported by the large Daniel Island community in so many ways, whether its partnerships for this or with Bishop England."

"In senior living, you talk in terms of community," continued Davis. "Having worked in other places I can say that community legitimately exists here. It's Bishop England, it's the Daniel Island Academy, it's the moms with the baby joggers who come off the sidewalks to say hi to our folks, people walking their dogs who come in, that's what it's all about."

In closing, Davis also thanked the Daniel Island Rotary Club and the Daniel Island Community Fund for their support of the project, and also North Charleston printing company Fast Signs for donating the labor in creating the display.

Slifer offers optimistic forecast

economy has suffered because of the gridlock we've had in Washington for the last eight years or longer."

Enter President-Elect Donald Trump. Slifer is hopeful the new Commander in Chief will do his part to get things back on track. His first course of action could be lowering the corporate tax rate to around 20 percent, noted Slifer, which would "put us back in line with the rest of the world." Trump could also decide to allow U.S. companies to bring overseas earnings back into the country at a tax rate of 10 percent.

"You can imagine three or four trillion dollars being taxed at 10 percent – that's 300 or 400 billion dollars-worth of tax revenues," Slifer said. "That's a good thing...I'm really excited about that particular piece if it comes to pass."

President-Elect Trump could also ease regulatory burdens - getting rid of what Slifer calls "unnecessary, needlessly complex, overlapping" regulations that hinder some members of the business community. In addition, he could make extensive revisions to Obamacare, said Slifer. All of these potential actions, along with cutting individual income taxes, are likely to increase revenues, bring down the deficit, and get the economy growing again, predicted Slifer.

"I think it's a fairly reasonable, well thought out plan," he said. "I get encouraged about that and it makes me hope that we're going to

have a little bit of a change in fiscal policy as we go forward...It's my hope that that unleashes a wave of investment spending which in fact gooses up productivity growth."

LOOKING AHEAD TO 2017-2018

Consumer confidence is up, reported Slifer, and there are "lots of reasons why we ought to feel good." With the stock market at a record high and debt (in relation to income) at its lowest rate in 20 or 30 years, there is reason for optimism, he said.

"If we want to go out and spend a little more quickly, we have the ability to do that."

Slifer also pointed to readily available credit, a growth rate of 170,000 new jobs per month, and a drop in gasoline prices as reasons he expects to see a 2.5 percent growth in consumer spending over the next several years.

"Remember, we're two thirds of the pie, so you have a core piece of this GDP that looks like it's going to grow at reasonable rate."

Other positives noted by Slifer – home sales are at the fastest rate they've been thus far in the cycle and demand continues to exceed supply. Additionally, mortgage rates are still relatively affordable and well below what they were 16 years ago. On the rental side, supply is short and the vacancy rate is down to the lowest it's been since 1985.

"If you want to go and rent somewhere in ar-

eas around the country, you'll have a really hard time finding an available property," said Slifer. "Given that, it's not surprising that rents are on the rise, steadily accelerating at 3.5 percent in the last year."

Slifer also reported a rise in car and truck sales – another revealing statistic.

"Autos and housing are our two biggest ticket items in our budget," he said. "If we're getting antsy and nervous, those are the places that you see that slowdown first, and there is absolutely none. So everything I see related to the consumer looks pretty positive."

TOUGH ON TRUMP

While Slifer is encouraged by the new change in leadership in Washington and what that may mean for the economy, he hopes President-Elect Trump steers clear of negativity.

"Trump manages to talk about a lot of pretty ugly stuff," Slifer told his audience. "...He's talking about building walls, putting tariffs on goods coming from China, taxes on firms that choose to go overseas. I'm an economist. I don't like any of that sort of stuff. This goes back to Econ 101. Trade is good, right?"

During his campaign, Trump often criticized U.S. companies for sending thousands of jobs overseas. Slifer argues that giving companies a more business-friendly environment at home will encourage them to stick around.

"I'm hoping that as we evolve, we'll get away from all of the nastiness he was talking about before and try to encourage US firms to stay here."

There is reason to focus on the positives, added Slifer. While he noted that the year 2020 is the earliest the country may experience another recession, the potential increase in U.S. companies' coffers, a slow raising of rates from the Federal Reserve, a modest uptick in inflation, and a potentially record-breaking expansion are all encouraging.

"This (current) expansion started in June of 2009," added Slifer. "...If it lasts until June of 2020, that's 11 years...it's going to go down in history books as the longest expansion on record...It doesn't get much better. I really believe that if we can get some of these policy changes that we talked about...it's really going to get us out of this slow growth mode and lots of good things will happen in the interim."

Ultimately, Slifer predicts that GDP will increase to 2.3 percent in 2017 and 2.6 percent in 2018. When one audience member asked if there are any storm clouds we should be watching for, Slifer called on his trademark optimism to finish out his presentation.

"I'm proud that I've stuck with a reasonably upbeat scenario, when you think about all the ugliness that everybody gets scared about – and, man, economists love to talk about bad news and the horrible, nasty things that can happen. But this economy has been going now for a long time and it looks like it's going to keep going... If we can really pull off some of these positive things, it just really might get better... I'm not giving up yet!"






DIS presents 'A Charlie Brown Christmas!'



Drive past the intersection of Village Crossing Drive and Pierce Street and you will see Christmas pomp and circumstance in the form of elaborate decorations that increase the electric bill, attract neighbors and passersby, and bring a spirit of goodwill to all who visit.

After ECCO found that almost 20 percent of its clients lived in the Cainhov/ Wando/Huger area, the organization realized the great need for medical and dental care, home repair, education classes, and job assistance in this rural community.

In 2014, ECCO partnered with local and community sponsors, including the Daniel Island Community Fund, Christ Our King Catholic Church, Benefitfocus, Nucor Steel, Google, BP, and the Wando-Huger Community Fund of Coastal Community Foundation of SC, to build the center and fund its first few years of operation.

The Baldwin Carson building hosts ECCO's medical, dental and health education programs, as well as skills training and human services. The center offers Huger residents access to prescription assistance, medical health information and medical and dental screenings, with medical referrals via a nurse practitioner from MUSC's College of Nursing. Local IT and business professionals assist with computer and home budgeting classes

while staffing the job resource center. Complimentary Internet access is provided to all center visitors.

ECCO's mission is to provide safety net services to our low-income neighbors, while empowering them to create better lives for themselves, their families, and their communities. The organization strives to eliminate poverty in the East Cooper region, and focuses on three main program areas: basic needs, health services, and empowerment and education. More than 4,500 households annually receive assistance for food, clothing, household goods, and financial aid, along with access to dental and medical care, treatment for chronic diseases, prescription assistance, health education, counseling, financial literacy classes, savings programs, job readiness training, and a range of specialized employment services.

Taking 'No' out of your playbook: And why it matters

Leaders understand that obstacles are a part of the landscape on the road to success. But how many leaders are self-aware enough to realize that some of the obstacles blocking their desired success are self-inflicted?

When what stands between your employees or volunteers and potential success is a constant drumbeat of "no" or the good ole standby of, "We've never done it this way before," then you are capping your talent and are hindering your chances of success.

In his book, "It's Not About the Coffee," former Starbucks International president Howard Behar writes of the necessity of taking "no" out of your playbook. His thought was that we can grow so accustomed to saying no to our customers or employees that soon these roadblocks take on a life of their own and become the unspoken rules, the No Book, that stands between you and your potential success.

One example Behar shared about Starbucks turning an everyday "no" into a "yes" was by opening the door early in the morning. Customers would come by ten minutes before the store opened and they were routinely turned away. The message the prospective customer would get was, "No, we're not open yet." When they realized they could say yes they began to open ten minutes before the posted opening to serve their customers.

To be sure, not every yes will guarantee success and not every no will deny it. But what you must realize is that until you release the power of possibilities in your people they will never have a chance to find out. Taking "no" out of your playbook will unlock their potential and give them much needed freedom to grow. That is critical to your success. Here is why taking "no" out of your playbook matters to you as a leader.

IT EMPOWERS YOUR PEOPLE.

There is no better way to empower

your people than to release their creative ingenuity with a "yes" attitude. It signals that you believe in them and want them to reach their full potential. Empowered people are driven people and are more invested in the product and outcomes. When you remove "no" from the playbook and replace it with a yes then you elevate everyone to a new level.

IT PUTS THE FOCUS WHERE IT BELONGS.

When "no" is replaced with a 'yes' then the playbook becomes a different document. The paradigm shifts. You go from playing defense to playing offense. Now instead of the focus being inward it's outward. Where once it was all about you, now it's about those you serve. When your purpose revolves around a "yes we can" mentality then there is no room for "no we can't" detractors. When your people are free to focus on what they can do, instead of what they can't do, it will make a world of difference.

IT CREATES MOMENTUM.

Some leaders exert a lot of energy and waste a lot of time trying to figure out the secret to creating a culture of momentum. Sadly, what some do not realize is that they are the reason why it's lacking. Why? They haven't taken "no" out of their playbooks and consequently their much-needed momentum lies dormant.

What would it take to motivate you? Former Miami Dolphin's great Bob Kuechenberg shares how he got his. He tells the story of his father and uncle who were human cannonballs in carnivals. His father told him, "go to college or be a cannonball," said Kuechenberg. Then one day his uncle came out of the cannon and missed the net and hit the Ferris wheel. It was then that Kuechenberg decided to go to college.

As a leader you can either take "no" out of your playbook and put in a resounding "yes," or be shot out of a cannon. Why not release the potential of your people, focus on those you serve, and generate the momentum you need? Say yes!



City of Charleston Police are investigating a Bishop England High School student who allegedly threatened to harm students at the facility last week. According to Lt. Jim Byrne, commanding officer for Daniel Island-based Team 5, the student is a 15 year-old Daniel Island resident.

A police report filed on the incident states that an officer was called to the school on Wednesday, December 7, in reference to the threat. School personnel told police that at 8:45 a.m. they were informed that the student was going to "shoot up" the school that day. The employees then checked the attendance roster and noted that the student was not present at school.

The report went on to indicate that school personnel believed the threat was made in a private conversation with another student the evening before – and that the suspect told the other student not to show up to school that day.

"That private conversation was then posted on social media by an unknown person," stated the report.

After learning of the threat, BE staff members contacted the student's parents, who told them he was home sick that day and staying with his grandmother. When police phoned the grandmother, there was no answer, so two officers went to the residence to speak with the student. When questioned, the student reportedly denied he had made the threat, but later told officers that he was watching a video of a school shooting and that maybe someone overheard the video. According to the police report, he told officers that his father does own firearms but that they were locked up. The report also stated that the student's father later informed officers that he would ensure that all guns in the house were secured.

Bishop England Principal Patrick Finneran issued a statement via email to school parents shortly before noon on Wednesday indicating that there was "a safety concern" at the school.

"The police were called as a precaution to keep our students, faculty and staff safe," wrote Finneran. "After investigating the situation and speaking with the people involved, we and the police have determined that there is no threat to our students."

The school continued normal operations for the rest of the day. In an update announcement sent out to school families on Thursday, Finneran provided more detailed information about the incident.

"A teacher at Bishop England High School received information on Wednesday...that a student had made general threats against the student population at the high school...Bishop England officials are cooperating with the City Police during the ongoing investigation. During this time, there will be an increased police presence on campus."

Finneran went on to report that the student who allegedly made the statement was not on campus when the allegation was received and has not been permitted to return to campus pending the outcome of the investigation.

"Bishop England High School officials take any type of threat seriously," he continued in his message. "They are committed to providing a safe environment for their students, teachers and staff."

"Anytime that an allegation or issue of this nature is brought to the attention of the police department, it is taken seriously and investigated fully so that we know whether or not there is a danger or risk to the students or to the greater population of the city," added Lt. Byrne. "Whether or not this case involves something credible is at the very nature of the investigation."

BE boys' basketball team suffers loss to No. 1 Porter-Gaud

Despite defeat, season outlook promising, says coach

The Bishop England boys' varsity basketball team dropped a 64-54 decision to rival Porter-Gaud on Saturday night. After the game, you didn't find Bishop coach Bryan Grevey sulking or searching for excuses – and for good reason.

After all, Porter-Gaud, 9-0, is ranked No. 1 in the state and No. 24 in the nation, according to MaxPreps, a website that specializes in coverage of high school sports.

"Porter-Gaud is very, very good," Grevey said. "They probably have five Division I players on their roster and we played them very close. JP (John Pearson) does a great job and always has his team ready to play. Any other game, we would have won."

Even with the loss, the Bishops have a very healthy 6-3 record heading into this week's action. Porter-Gaud has pinned two of the losses on the Bishops while Class AAAAA entry Wando handed the Bishops their other setback.

The Bishops have the talent, experience

and coaching to contend for the Region 8-AAA title this winter, but it won't be easy. Lake Marion and Timberland both have won recent state titles in basketball and the region should be balanced from top to bottom.

The Bishops have a nucleus of Brendan McHale, Christian Drummond and Leo Albano, players who each contribute something unique to the Bishops' attack.

McHale's father coached basketball in North Carolina and it's evident that McHale has learned from his father. He's talented and extremely coachable. He began the season as one of the top five seniors in the state, according to the South Carolina Basketball Coaches Association.

Drummond is a 6-5, 220-pounder who can score from inside or by hitting it from long distance.

"He provides problems for defenses because of his size," Grevey said. "He is a tremendous shooter for his size."

Albano is a three-sport star who also plays quarterback on the football team and pitcher on the baseball team. He also excels in the classroom.

"There is nothing but bright days ahead for Leo Albano," Grevey said.

The other starters include senior guard Ben Quinque and 6-5 senior Brian Privett, who give the Bishops another inside force.

Grevey is happy with his team's depth as well and rotates numerous players to keep fresh legs on the court.

The biggest factor in the Bishops' success just might be team chemistry.

"The biggest factor is this team has so much fun out there," Grevey said. "Everyone roots for each other. They don't care who gets the glory. All they want to do is win and have fun. Everyone supports each

The Bishops went 15-11 last year to record their first winning season since the 2007-08 campaign. This year, the Bishops are looking for another winning season and that means they will have to fare well in region play.

"It's an entirely new region for us since we moved up to Class AAA," Grevey said. "We have a big challenge ahead, but I like our chances."

It was windy, cold and a light rain was falling but Jackson and Dave kept on smiling. The sun was low on the horizon, when we pulled up to our last spot of the day (a long oyster bar in about a foot of water). We cast mud minnows to the base of the bar and Jackson quickly hooked a Redfish. Jackson and Dave fought the fish together and soon a


hero size Redfish came to the skiff. Jackson was amazed at the size of the fish. A great catch on light tackle and a personal best for Jackson.

The wind chill was near freezing both mornings - and the thermometer really didn't budge for most of the weekend as clouds and a stiff breeze made the work environment less than ideal.

But that didn't stop Kathleen Sumner from winning the 27th Annual Charles Tilghman Carolinas PGA Junior Championship, which was contested last Saturday and Sunday at the Members Club at Grande Dunes in Myrtle

Sumner, a senior at Bishop England High School, carded a 71 on both days to finish at par. She won the championship in a playoff against Grayen Burgess of Lexington.

Keeping warm isn't a problem for Sumner, who recently was named the Class AAA golfer of the year by the Coaches Association of Women's Sports (CAWS).

"You just have to layer up when it's cold out," said Sumner, who helped the Bishop girls win the Class AAA state championship last month. "You just try not to layer up too much. It's actually not bad because you are constantly moving around."

Sumner is one of the top female golfers in the state – and has the resume to prove it.

She used an 8-iron to ace the No. 9 hole, which is 135 yards and plays uphill.

She'll graduate in May and then matriculate to Tallahassee in late summer 2017.

"I'm really excited about Florida State," she said. "When the recruiting process first started. I didn't know too much about Florida State. But I have learned a lot. When I went there to visit, I had a lot of fun, and got to meet the coaches. It's an amazing situation."

Sumner points out that the FSU women's golf team is ranked No. 3 in the country. She also notes that she would like to contribute to the team's success as a freshman.

"I want to be in the top five and play in all the tournaments," she said. "I want to do
